### QUINCY PERFORMING ARTS MAKE A COMEBACK

fter struggling through the last two years of the COVID-19 pandemic, the performing arts are back in full swing in Quincy. Patrons can enjoy everything from comedy to Broadway music to outdoor festivals and more.

The City of Quincy has made it a priority to provide opportunities for residents to enjoy the performing arts in the heart of the city.

"I've been charged by the mayor to activate the Hancock Adams Common and other parts of the downtown area to bring performance art to the community," said John F. McDonald in his capacity as Special Events Coordinator for the City of Quincy. McDonald is also Executive Producer & Event Planner of JM Productions and Rising Stars.

The city provides a monthly event on the Hancock Adams Common, bringing in local, multicultural, and professional talent. Over the summer, the Quincy Symphony and Quincy Choral Society joined for a fun Pops concert. Another lively event included multicultural acts performing five hours of dance, music, and song.

Quincy's Annual Family Winterfest offers fun for the whole family during the Presidents' Day Weekend with outdoor interactive experiences, live music, and special performances at Hancock Adams Common, Town Hall, and Church of the Presidents. The event celebrates the two United States Presidents from Quincy—John Adams and John Quincy Adams. The winter event is scheduled to return this year.

"We celebrate different parts of the calendar year, bringing performance artists to the community," said McDonald.

#### **Productions Around Town**

The JM Productions Showboat Cruises returned this summer. The final cruise of the season on September 1 featured a four-hour Labor Day cruise and fireworks. Summer voyages from Squantum Point Park in Marina Bay featured a two-hour senior citizen cruise and a three-hour evening cruise.

JM Productions has been bringing quality entertainment to audiences for 45 years. The fall season kicked off with a cabaret show called "Hey, Old Friends" at the Woodward School in Quincy on September 30. The reunion show will be the last cabaret performance for JM Productions, a casualty of the pandemic and rising costs.

"It's a special event because for 45 years in this community—aside from the time I lived in New York City working on Broadway and other parts of the entertainment world—I had my own cabaret dinner theater production company. Covid pretty much put everybody out of business, so I had to reinvent myself and decided to give it one more try," said McDonald. Unfortunately, that part of his business will be shutting down after the show.

"Hey, Old Friends" will be bringing back 15 guest artists from favorite cabaret and musical theatre productions over the years. The evening promises to be filled with wonderful music, funny stories, and poignant moments. McDonald himself, who worked on Broadway and taught at the Woodward School as Art Department Chair and Assistant to the Headmaster,

In North Weymouth, the Bicknell Square Village Festival was held beachside at Wessagusset Beach. # Food Insecurity Continues to Increase in Massachusetts

ising inflation and the termination of relief benefits has disproportionately hurt people with lower incomes and people of color. These factors along with recovery from the last two years of the pandemic have contributed to an increase in food insecurity.

According to the Greater Food Bank of Boston, one indicator of increased need in Massachusetts has been pantry usage, which has remained higher than pre-pandemic levels. Pantry demand has increased in recent months with Latinx and households with children showing the biggest percentage increase in usage from 2020 to 2021.

"In the history of our organization, we have never seen so many people reaching out for help, especially for food. We were already serving record-setting numbers of people before inflation started impacting lives and gas prices increased. Since April, each month we have been serving 20 percent more households compared to the previous year," said Rick Doane, Executive Director of Interfaith Social

Services, which operates a food pantry in Quincy. It serves ten towns on the South Shore and is celebrating its 75th anniversary.

#### Second Annual Report on Food Insecurity, Equity, and Access in Massachusetts

The Greater Boston Food Bank (GBFB) published its second annual Massachusetts statewide survey on food insecurity, equity, and access to hunger-relief assistance programs. The new study was conducted in late 2021 and early 2022 to expand on the findings of the first surve. The goal was to identify the prevalence of food insecurity during the second year of the COVID-19 pandemic as well as gaps and disparities in food assistance use in order to increase awareness and develop data-driven recommendations to increase food equity and access.

"The preexisting inequities and gaps in food access that were exacerbated by the pandemic persist in our state, continuing to disproportionately and detrimentally affect Massachusetts' most vulnerable residents," said Catherine D'Amato, GBFB GBFB estimates that 1.8 million adults in Massachusetts experienced food insecurity in 2021.

President and CEO. "In the face of the highest increase in food costs we've seen in 40 years, which is contributing to the enduring inequity and unprecedented need for food assistance, we remain committed to our mission of ending hunger alongside our network of partners throughout Massachusetts."

GBFB estimates that 1.8 million adults in Massachusetts experienced food insecurity in 2021. The survey found that food insecurity rates were highest among Latinx adults, Black adults, people who identify as LGBTQ+, and adults with children.

But it's not all bad news. GBFB reports, "Over the last two years, varying attempts to measure the prevalence of food insecurity indicate that, while the need for food assistance has increased, the extraordinary public and private response, and investments in the federal and charitable food systems, have helped cushion the otherwise devastating blow of the pandemic for millions of Americans."

The study included recommendations for improving the food assistance experience in Massachusetts with the goal of increasing awareness and support, decreasing inequities in food access, and improving the experiences of those receiving the services of hunger relief organizations.

# How to Choose a Funeral Home When Transferring Advance Plans

here may be times you'll need to consider transferring your advance funeral plans—for instance, if you move away or your funeral home closes or changes hands. You may wonder if your money is safe and how to choose the right funeral home. We talked with Joe Reardon, Vice President for Community Development and Advance Planning, to get some answers.

## Does it matter if someone has already prepaid when transferring advance plans?

It doesn't matter, but when people prepay for a funeral, they want to know that their money is safe if they move or if the funeral home goes out of business. The money is always safe, because it's held in a trust. Even if a funeral home closes or the person relocates, the funds are still there and the arrangements are still in place—they just transfer the contract. Many families are unaware of that fact.

We just want people to know that these contracts are transferable and that the money you set aside is safe.

### When should someone consider transferring plans?

In our experience, people will transfer their plans most often because they're moving, and they want to have that plan available to them, wherever they go. For instance, if they are moving to a senior living community near their daughter in another state, they can transfer an existing advanced contract to a funeral home near where they will be living to make sure that their arrangements are carried out and that the financial resources are there to do it.

The other time to transfer plans is if a funeral home goes out of business, when they will be faced with choosing a different funeral home. In Massachusetts, it is required under state laws and regulations that each person holding a contract with that funeral home must be notified by certified mail that the business is closing and be advised that they should transfer their contract to another funeral home.

Most people don't expect a funeral home to close when making arrangements, although some do ask about it. That's why when Keohane is writing advanced contracts, I always tell people that their contract is transferrable if you ever move or if the funeral home goes out of business.

#### How do you choose a funeral home and what is the process of transferring funeral plans?

We encourage families to choose a funeral home based on fit. There are two P's to consider: People and Place. Are the funeral directors and other members of the team competent, compassionate, and willing to take good care of you? The other consideration is place. Are the facilities well maintained, and do you feel comfortable there? We encourage families to meet with funeral homes so that they can get a feel for the people and the place. The transfer process is very simple. It's just a matter of signing a couple of documents.

# What other areas of funeral care should be considered when transferring plans?

Because funeral services have changed so dramatically over the past number of years, it is important for families to consider how that funeral home will fulfill their needs. The day of the cookiecutter funeral is long gone. Now, families are looking for more personal and meaningful ceremonies. We find families are looking for a ritual observance, but they don't want a religious service. So, when choosing a funeral home, consider whether that funeral home is able to meet your wishes, or if it is a funeral home that isn't flexible or keeping up with the needs of today's families.

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## OUR TEAM Elizabeth Gribaudo


